

Frequently Asked Questions

How do I register?

Visit sonomacountyparks.org & click "Education Programs." Submit the online form. You will be offered a date by email within 2 weeks of your application. Please be sure to check your spam/ junk mail folder. Add Kristina.Stanton@sonoma-county.org and Christina.McGuirk@sonoma-county.org to your safe senders list. You may also fax or mail the hardcopy form.

How much does it cost?

\$5 per student for regular programs, \$8 for the Tolay Fall Festival. There is no fee for parents or chaperones. School groups and parent chaperones do not pay parking fees during field trips. We recommend a 1:3 parent to student ratio for primary grades & 1:5 ratio for upper grades. Make checks payable to Sonoma County Regional Parks. Pay fees the day you attend the program.

Are scholarships available?

Scholarships are available on a first come, first served basis for Title I schools in Sonoma County for all programs except the Tolay Fall Festival. One program can be scholarshiped per group. Please list your request on your application form. When approved, the Sonoma County Parks Foundation pays the \$5 per student fee. We have no funding to cover transportation at this time.

What if rain is predicted?

Staff will contact you on the day before your trip if rain is predicted. Please be sure to include a cell or evening phone number on your registration form. We reserve the right to cancel if necessary and will make every reasonable effort to reschedule.

What if I need to cancel?

Teacher cancellations need to be made by email at least 1 month in advance or you will still be responsible to pay the invoice. Our programs sell out & this provides enough time for another teacher to obtain approval to come. Scholarship groups that cancel with short notice may be ineligible for future scholarships.

Students will learn about ecosystem diversity, endangered species, and the importance habitat plays in a healthy community. Activities and lessons reinforce grade-specific science standards that include habitats, animal life cycles, and adaptations.



February - June Tuesday - Friday

Grades 1-6 9:30 am - 12:30 pm

Introduction to watersheds. Activities reinforce grade-specific science standards that include the water cycle, seasons, weathering, erosion and deposition, the Sonoma County watershed, non-point source pollution, and the effects of water pollution.

Grades 1-3 9:30 am - 11:30 am Grades 4-6 9:30 am - 12:30 pm

The field trip will focus on the properties of the common rocks and minerals in the park and the processes that formed them. Students will also learn the importance of recycling products manufactured from minerals and rocks, like glass and aluminum, as a simple way to conserve natural resources.

Students will learn the science behind weather and weather patterns. They will learn about some of Sonoma County's many microclimates within the parks, and forecast local weather based on observation and data collection.
